### **Course Description and Purpose:**

This course provides an introductory overview of the American criminal justice system. We will examine the history, functions, structures, processes and interactions of the three principal components of American criminal justice: police, courts and corrections.

2. An increased understanding of the three principal components of the criminal justice system, and their function.
3. Demonstrate your ability to critically engage, discuss, and reflect on materials related to the issues associated with crime and society.

## **Student Expectations (Assignments):**

### 1) Attendance & Participation

Participation and attendance are required and mandatory, as they count toward your grade.

### 2) Reading Material & Questions

Readings are assigned for every class. Students are expecting to have the read the material before class to understand the material being presented. Readings will be assigned with questions to engage and ensure understanding.

### 3) Reflection Writings/Reaction paper

Students will write and submit a 4-page minimum summary for BOTH books read this semester.

Your writing should contain a summary of the book, what stood out for you as relevant or interesting and why.

You are encouraged to weave into this paper: 1) personal experience, 2) the topics discussed in class lectures, 3) theories discussed in class 4) PowerPoints and texts to frame your discussion and/or a news article related to the topics discussed in the texts.

### 4) Book Presentation 1

There will be a book presentation based on the reading "Women who Offend". Students, in groups will present a summary of the chapter and conduct a class discussion of the material. It is expected that all students will read the book and participate in both the presentation and discussion. If you miss your portion of the class presentation, it is your responsibility to discuss a make-up option with me.

#### 5) Book Presentation 2

There will be a group assignment based on the reading "The New Jim Crow". Students, in groups will present a summary of the chapter and conduct a class discussion of the material. It is expected that all students will read the book and participate in both the presentation and discussion. If you miss your portion of the class presentation, it is your responsibility to discuss a make-up option with me.

#### 6) Class Activities

There will be a variety of class activities related to the topics covered in class.

#### 7) Quizzes (mini-exams)

There will be 4 quizzes over the course of the semester to ensure mastery of the topics covered over the course of the semester. Quizzes will be completed on Blackboard.

#### 8) Final Paper

There will be a final paper that will be explained later in the semester. The paper will cover topics discussed during the semester and will "test" your ability to apply topics covered over the course semester in writing.

### **Student Expectations (Classroom behavior):**
